TRY NOT TO ABANDON YOUR SPOUSE

My son died. I blamed my husband. He isn't a bad husband, but the stupid things he did, in my mind led to my son's death. This could be true. It could be imagined, Either way, he is the person who along with myself, knew our son best. So in my grief, I could scream and yell at him, but at least he knew what I was talking about. We shared loving our son, we shared his favorite foods, tv shows, everything about him. Now he is gone and the one person I hate the most at the moment is also the one person who best understands what I am going through.

People say that the death of a child will make you fall apart or make you stronger as a couple, as a family, and as a person. The best thing you can do at first, is remember what you have shared together and stick together. You need each other between the rage and hurt and all the up and down feelings.

Your marriage may not stand, but don't make that decision for a while, like everything else, this is a whole new world, this world of losing a child and falling apart, and no one understanding. Your spouse, love him or hate him, know what you are going through and is going through the same thing, even though he might be handling it totally different.

Compassionate friend meetings are very important when you are new to this. It is important for you to meet and talk to people who have gone through what

you are going through. It is also very smart to speak with other women, and for men to speak with other men. That sounds like a contradiction, since men don't usually do much speaking. That's why it is a good idea to stick the men together in a group and lock the door. Siblings also can really benefit from meeting with other siblings. If your group is too small to supply what you need, talk to the leader and see if groups can come together, just women, just men, just kids or something. Or look on line for other similar groups. Don't stay home and rot in your grief, or let your hatred fester. God is the answer for some, others turn away from God in their anger. Others don't have religious beliefs in the first place. We are all different, but we have all lost a child, that shouldn't happen, and we need to talk to other people who can truly feel your pain, people who have walked this path before you. You will feel like many friends have abandoned you. It is because they are clueless and can't deal with your pain.

This brings me back to the beginning. Don't give up on your spouse, or at least not right away. You probably need each other and if you can survive this, you will be much stronger and better off in the long run. This is the worst part of the *for better of for worse*., but if you can remember that, perhaps you can get past it and still have a life together.

Things to Remember

What to do and not to do Part 1 (so this doesn't become an entire book)

My child has just died. I can run around like a chicken. I can bury my head in the sand. I can scream and cry. I can punch things. I can break things. I can cancel everything I may have coming up in my life. I am pretty sure at least one of these things or something similar may have crossed your mind.

One of the first things I learned at my first Compassionate Friends meeting was that it is very very important not to make any major decisions for quite some time. We aren't rational. Our emotions are all over the place. We may regret things we have done in haste, even though it might take a few years to realize the regret.

DO NOT FORGET OR ABANDON YOUR

OTHER CHILDREN. I have seen people so engulfed in their grief that their other children are almost totally left behind. I consider myself fortunate that I had a 7 month old baby at the same time I lost my 4 year old son. If I didn't take care of my baby, he would die. Also, I could hold and squeeze him all day and give him the love I wanted to give to my 4 year old. He needed love and care and affection. Perhaps this made it easier for me, or perhaps that is just the way I think, but either way, regardless of the age of your other children, don't forget about them. If they are

old enough to know what happened, they are grieving as well. People tend to forget about the kids. They always ask how the mom is doing, or how the wife is doing, the kids get left by the wayside. They sometimes are even told to stay strong for their parents. Meanwhile, you may notice acting out and inappropriate behaviors and instead of helping them through their grief, you ask them to chill out and give you a break because you are grieving. It is a horrible situation for you and for them and the best way to get through it is to get through it together. Remember this one thing. We all grieve, we all grieve differently and at our own pace, BUT it is us together that truly know how each other feels. We have all lost something that other people can never truly imagine. We can talk and scream at each other, just remember that a hug, or an "I love you" should be given at the end. Call it a private grief session, call it whatever you want, but we all need to get it out, and at first this might be the best, or a good way to get started on the road to recovery. It might be loud, it might be ugly, but we need to do it. We need all these things, the crying, the hurting, the pain, we need it all to get to a new place that we are totally unfamiliar with in our lives.

<u>Leader:</u> This is the person or persons who have the key to get into the Founders Hall, where we have our meetings. The leader makes sure there are refreshments and prepares the room for the meeting. He also prepares the Founders Hall with chairs gets tables out and all the forms needed to sign up new friends and information pamphlets, At the end puts everything back the way it was.

<u>Steering Committee</u>. This is a group of **YOUNG** people, not old bats like us. They help the leader(s) make decisions on new projects such as butterfly releases or any other projects such as contents of the packet sent to new friends.
